Minutes of the PASCO Board of Directors

May 6, 2002

Meeting at the office of BASE Consulting, Oakland, Calif., was convened at 7:08 p.m..

ATTENDING: Directors: Jim Alton, Buck Arnold, John Bell, Karol Hines, Rolf Peterson. Member: Bernald Smith

TELECONFERENCE: Peter Deane NOT PRESENT: Directors: Andrew McFall, Chad Moore, Kenny Price, Ty White.

TREASURER'S REPORT: John Bell presented a draft budget for 2002. The proposed budget estimated \$9,458 total income and \$10,050 total expenses for a net deficit of approximately \$592.

Current operating funds are \$10,404.85 excluding the scholarship fund. Due to the timing of membership renewals, this number is expected to drop to about \$5,000 at mid year before rebounding. The Board approved the 2002 Budget.

The Board was advised that a periodic audit is needed. John Bell and Karol Hines will make arrangements for a treasury audit.

John Bell proposed billing for Westwind advertising more frequently than once a year. Karol Hines will send letters requesting payment from advertisers whose checking accounts were closed before checks paying for ads were deposited or who are arrears in ad payments.

The Board accepted the treasurer's report.

COMMITTEE REPORTS:

PUBLICATIONS: Work is in progress on the PASCO Web site.

It was suggested that Ty White get reciprocal agreements to have pointers to FBO and club Web sites on the PASCO Web site with pointers to the PASCO Web site on FBO and club Web sites.

Karol Hines will continue working with Janice Hoke to revise advertising rates for Westwind.

Buck Arnold suggested working through site representatives to solicit consortium block ads from multiple advertisers at individual soaring sites. MEMBERSHIP: There are no new developments on preparation of a membership handbook and preparation of membership kits for Region 11 FBOs.

AWARDS: Publication of descriptions and criteria for PASCO awards in WestWind is planned.

PUBLIC RELATIONS: Karol Hines and Rolf Peterson will complete revisions to the *How to Become a Glider Pilot* brochure and submit them to Janice Hoke by June 15.

Karol Hines will write an article on "PASCO and You" to be published in WestWind.

At the BASA April membership meeting, Karol Hines, Ty White, and Buck Arnold made a presentation on PASCO activities and what PASCO does for its members and they solicited feedback. PASCO Directors will be visiting soaring sites to make similar presentations and solicit feedback regarding PASCO activities. Karol Hines will write some talking points for use by the directors making site visits.

Site representatives have not been designated for Avenal, Byron, and Crazy Creek. Karol Hines will develop proposed responsibilities for site representatives.

SAFETY: No report:

COMPETITION: The Region 11 contest at Minden, scheduled June 15-16 and 22-24, has been canceled because of runway paving work at Minden during the time the contest was scheduled.

The Region 11 North Contest at Siskiyou County Airport, scheduled May 27-31, will have both Open Class and 15-Meter Class competi-

Peter Deane will work on scheduling regional contests next year at Minden and possibly at Avenal. He will also investigate making bids for future national contests in Region 11.

PASCO LEAGUE: Fifteen pilots participated in the first PASCO League Contest of the season at Avenal, April 4-5. The dates of the PASCO League Contests at Air Sailing and at Minden have been changed. The new schedule is Minden on June 8-9 and Air Sailing on July 27-28.

FAA LIAISON: No new issues.

EQUIPMENT: A sale price for the PASCO equipment trailer will be determined and an ad placed in WestWind.

OLD BUSINESS: Buck Arnold will continue looking for a suitable venue for the PASCO Banquet and Fall Safety Seminar in the Sacramento area or possibly the Stockton area. He did not find a suitable venue in the Fairfield, Vacaville, or Davis areas.

NEW BUSINESS: Bernald Smith proposed that PASCO submit a proposal to SSA to hold the 2006 World Soaring Championships at Tonopah, Nev. The possibility of joint sponsorship with Region 12/RESCO was discussed. The Board voted to prepare a proposal and submit it to the SSA by Aug. 15. Karol Hines and Peter Deane will take the lead in contacting potential contest promoters and preparing the proposal.

Seminar designed for the budding cross-country pilot

The fourth PASCO Cross-Country Seminar was held on March 9in a lecture hall of the physics department of the University of California at Berkeley. The co-hosts were Sumner Davis, a glider pilot and Emeritus physics professor, representing the university, and Carl Herold, a PASCO founder and an SSA Hall of Famer. Over 86 delegates and guests were in attendance for the 7 a.m. continental breakfast and the eight hours of briefings.

This seminar was the fourth in a series of annual events. The first three were tailored for the more experienced pilots. This one was aimed at the beginning-to-moderately-experienced glider pilot, one who had some cross-country orientation, possibly some PASCO League experience or Air Sailing camp attendance, and who is looking to take the next learning steps to achieve the SSA Soaring Badges.

The speakers brought into their discussions many hours of experience in XC planning and flying, beginning with flights from local glider ports to the nearest landing sites. Fixed base operators and seasoned pilots were present to assist in describing local lift, good weather patterns, preferred routes for leaving the field, and safe landing sites. Other experienced pilots discussed mentoring, preparing for badge flights, and decision-making in the air.

Following a welcome and introduction, the first speaker was
Kempton Izuno who set the theme for the day. He noted that a budding XC pilot should have experience that includes briefings like those at PASCO League events, the blessing of a CFIG, a 5 hr Silver Badge duration leg, and at least 50 hours in the glider being flown.

The five site-briefers were Ty White (Crazy Creek), Gary Kemp (Williams), Steve Brockman (Hollister), Bob Korves (Truckee), and Chad Moore (Air Sailing). Each had a Hotspot map of a 45nm radius (courtesy of Jim Conger), a landout map of 100 nm radius, a 3D high resolution terrain site map of 45 nm radius, and a point of no return map of 100 nm radius (the latter all courtesy of Carl Herold). They each spent 30 minutes briefing attendees on the FBO, club, mentors, and preferred routes for badge flights. They identified unique weather (good and bad) and possible landing sites.

From each came one final piece of advice.

White: Get high, stay high, fly a conservative L/D at all times.

Kemp: Think ahead. Then just do it. Brockman: Areas of lift are well-delineated. Pay attention and fly to them, with no random searching. Korves: Think ahead for safe landout locations. Have alternate routes for heading home.

Moore: Pick out trial tasks, with turnpoints that are never out of gliding range of the home airport. For skill building fly cat's-cradle courses.

In the afternoon, Peter Deane focused on more general key items, such as when to tow, getting high and staying high, when to leave the home airport, speeds to fly and max L/D for headwinds, and how to avoid unplanned off field landings. His concluding remarks were, "make the flight on a good soaring day, make it early from a familiar home base, and have a responsive crew rather than a

demanding one." In short, fly, fly, fly!

Dan Gudgel gave a vital description of new soaring forecast tools under development by Walt Rogers and Jack Glendening. He commented that "Weather reports are now a man-machine mix, although the weather continues to be chaotic."

Jim Conger spoke of his successful efforts to catalog the locations of thermal hot spots and insight into their characteristics. His message is, "Keep circling, baby, and tell me about it!"

Carl Herold spoke briefly of his monumental catalog of landing sites and points of no return in California and Nevada. He also had some words of wisdom about flying in the Great Basin: "Not – How do I get to the next thermal, but – How do I minimize sink in going from A to B."

At the close of the day, a fivepage single-spaced potpourri of tactics compiled by Deane, Izuno, and Herold was distributed. It alone was worth the price of the seminar. The topical headings were, What glider should you purchase? Developing Soaring Skills, Glide performance judgment, Off-field landing practice, First XC flight tactics, and Learning plateaus.

In conclusion, each attendee received 8 hours of briefings and discussions, purchased a CD of the seminar with all of the briefings included, and additional reference and handout material.

A four-year summary of PASCO cross-country seminars

The table below shows the levels of delegates and complimentary attendees, who were the speakers and other volunteers, like the cameraman, CD production team, and invited guests, including Berkeley (non soaring) students and faculty. The first year's briefings were held on a Saturday and Sunday. The second day was required because of the large turnout.

The next three years the briefings were held at the University of California, Berkeley, Le Conte Physics Building lecture room with seating for 200 delegates. On behalf of RESCO, Jim Paine ran a seminar at Cal City for about 20 delegates in 2000 and 2001. Jim had a great 62-delegate turnout when he obtained the Edwards AFB Test Pilots School auditorium.

In addition to briefing a combined audience of 523 glider pilots and selling and comping 538 CDs (sold 30 at the SSA Convention at Albuquerque) over the past four years. The last column is a summary of the data published on the CD. The seminar sold 66 PASCO turnpoint books, and about 30 1999 large full-color posters of 3D renderings of GPS Flight Recorded soaring flights within the "The Great Basin." We have not been able to sell many of these expensive seven-color printed lacquered posters, which have been raffled each year at PASCO banquets and some soaring contest prizes.

The good news is that over 200 posters have been distributed for useful promotional purposes in places like the FAA, SSA, NAA, and the FAI offices around the country, the Executive Offices of the U.S. Government, the SSA Office, some areas of Congress, numerous Visitor Bureaus and Chambers of Commerce, and etc. These four years has resulted in a net loss financial loss of \$540. We recovered nearly \$800 at the recent seminar.

There is little question that these seminars have upped the enthusiasm and produced a lot of safe cross-country soaring, records and FAI Badges throughout the Great Basin, while producing an excellent recreational safety record at the same time. I still have over 50 posters left for promotional purposes. They sure help the public and others better understand the appeal and performance of our XC sport.

The Physics Department of the University of California receives a \$600 donation yearly from the PASCO Seminar in appreciation for their support and participation. The excess funds also cover the travel, food, and lodging for the seminar participants. Each participant receives a personal-

ized small plaque as a memento.

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The XC Seminar has supported RESCO, the Region 12 organization equivalent to PASCO. Jim Payne has used much of our material as well as his own to conduct three seminars, two at California City and a most successful one at Edwards AFB Test Pilot School Auditorium.

The only person paid during this seminar is a Physics Department technical person, who managed the 15-by-15-foot screen and video projector for the presentations as well as providing many other support functions, making sure all the equipment works and we have the video cables on line, as well as all the other goodies available in these 10 rows of elevated chairs by 20 chairs wide.

Support Group, has been the most
able coordinator for this seminar. All
the seminar team is invited to an
evening dinner at the Skates on the
Bay for a job well done on the evening
after the seminar. As you can imagine, this activity took more time and
preparation than most of the participants had planned. They still talk to
me, however. As Sumner stated
above, the seminars have been well
received by the delegates and speakers

Met man Dan Gudgel has been supported by NOAA for his travel, meals, and hotel. Every year, the Weather Service has been a great supporter of this XC Seminar. Numerous weather service facilities around the country have mounted our 1999 PASCO Seminar poster.

A Little Hearsay

PERLAN update: On June 6, the modified DG-505 PERLAN I glider and a lot of equipment including six space suits and special parachutes were closed in a shipping container to New Zealand. It should be arriving at Christchurch, South Island, on June 27, where the container will be moved to Omarama for assembly for a scientific research project to study the dissipation of the ozone layer which will be in the vicinity of known and research stratospheric waves. Pilot and Program Manager Einar Enevoldson, Administrator Pat Seamount, and backup pilot and ground crew Ken Briegleb will depart for New Zealand near the end of June. Their space suit and LOX man will soon follow. NASA and some meteorological persons will arrive once the project is ready to wave fly up to as high as 62,000 feet. By this time glider pilot Steve Fossett should have completed his solo balloon circumnavigation from and return to Australia to join the PERLAN team in New Zealand.

LANDOUT Version 1.0 CD is ready for sale by mail order for \$32 or over the counter for \$30 at High Country Soaring, Air Sailing, and Soar Minden. See the advertisement elsewhere in this issue.

The CD will contain:

- 1. A Read Me text file on how to use the information provided. This should be read first providing copyright, the assessment process, how to use this data for cross-country flight planning.

 2. An EXCEL 2000 spreadsheet covering 11 Western states (with a total of 175 not to land sites and 762 landing sites): The only two states well surveyed for glider landing sites are California (73 not to land sites and 339 landing sites) and Nevada (57 not to land and 164 landing sites).
- 3. A text file sorted first by maximum

obstacle width, state, and closest city name. This text file is available for insertion onto an iPAQ, CASIO, Palm or copied and imported into your flight recorder data file.

4. There will also be a collection of jpg files included on the CD showing

3D terrain maps covering all of the assessed areas in the 11 Western states. The sites in California and Nevada will be presented with landout site names labeled. The jpg files will be easily readable by MS Paint on your computer.

Keep your eyes on the PASCO awards

For those who anticipate great flights-and achievements this year, here are the categories of PASCO awards to apply for. Trophies will be presented at the PASCO Banquet in November.

PASCO Flight Awards are based on the honor system. The pilot must be a PASCO member at the time the flight is submitted for consideration.

PASCO Longest Distance Award

- · Cannot be a contest flight
- Must originate in Region 11 but may terminate anywhere, and turnpoints outside Region 11 are allowed.
- Up to 3 turnpoints are allowed, but no turnpoint may be used more than once. Turnpoints must be at least 10 km apart.
- · CH Handicap applies to the calculated distance.
- · Turnpoint must be turned as in a FAI badge flight.

PASCO Out and Return Award

- · Cannot be a contest flight
- · Must originate in Region 11 and terminate at starting point.
- · One turnpoint only.
- · CH Handicap applies to the calculated distance.
- · Turnpoint must be turned as in a FAI badge flight.

PASCO Longest Silver Distance Award

- Longest distance flight by PASCO member qualifying for F.A.I. Silver Badge.
- Must originate in Region 11.
- Claim must be for Silver Distance only (Silver Distance plus Altitude or Duration claims are allowed).
- Flight must be reported in the October 2001 issue of *Soaring*.
- No handicap applied.

PASCO Sawyer Award:

- Most accumulated points of cross country flights over the January-October flying season.
- Handicaps for pilot experience and ship. Contact Nick Thomas (contact information on page 2) for information.

Esther White Memorial Trophy

- Awarded to the most deserving crew person nominated by their pilot.
- Stories must be received by Oct. 1 for printing in WestWind. Send to Janice Hoke, 4188 Plateau Ct., Reno NV 89509 or email to Janice@abaris.com.
- The selection of a winner will be made by a committee selected by the PASCO Board of Directors.
- Note: Those pilots who submit nominations for this award, seldom have problems finding crew. Coincidental? I think not.

Hollister Gliding Club's quest for the PASCO Egg

Before Ramy Yanetz in his LS-4, and I in my DG-300 took off from the Hollister Gliding Club on May 22, we had talked about heading north towards Williams to capture the PASCO egg but weren't sure if the conditions were right for the 161-mile attempt.

We typically do not head north out of Hollister so it was uncharted territory for us. I launched first but was struggling over the hills just north of Hollister. Ramy decided to head south towards the Panoche Valley. He found good lift at our house thermal and climbed up to 7,500 feet. My luck was changing over the north hills, so Ramy decided to come join me and we made the commitment to go for the egg.

The cloud bases over the north hills just east of San Jose were at about 8,000 feet but we were able to find lift in between the clouds and climbed in 4 knots up to 10,000 feet. I played for a while taking pictures and let Ramy catch up. Ramy headed for Mt. Diablo, and I headed a little more to the east over the Byron airport. I worked the last cloud of the street that

was east of Mt. Diablo to 6,200 feet, about 72 miles from Hollister, while I decided the next course.

The next cloud street was much lower and started on the other side of the Delta near Rio Vista about 25 miles away. I turned northeast and flat-glided without a bump to Rio Vista. At 3,000 feet, I contacted lift again but could only climb to about 4,000 feet. Ramy crossed the Delta and headed more west for the Berryesa Ridge near Vacaville. He kept about 10 miles ahead of me the rest of the way by following the Berryesa Ridge to Williams. I was unable to get to the

good lift over the ridge and had to follow the cloud street over the valley. I was still not able to get above 4,000 feet until I was about 25 miles from Williams. where I found a good thermal that took me up to 7,500 feet and gave me final glide to Williams.

I flew with

Peter Kelly (PK) the rest of the way while he did wingovers and we took photos. Meantime Ramy had turned Williams and was attempting to return home but was only able to make it back to the Nut Tree airport in Vacaville.

So the credit for the egg should also go to Ramy as he got there first, even though he did not technically land there. It was a great HGC team effort!

I could wax on poetically about the good skill development that comes with participating in the contest, but a childish challenge gets more attention.

So I lay down the challenge. Do you build hours in your club, or just pose next to the glider and take pictures? Enter this contest and prove it! There are ten clubs in the area. Today the trophy is with me and the Minden Soaring Club. Who will have it next year?

This trophy is a symbol of a successful support system as well as the pilot's skill. You want this trophy. You need this trophy!

The contest totals quantitative soaring events for a year ending Oct. 15. This is in contrast to one quality flight like badges or records. Points are figured with expected performance of the glider, pilot, and launch altitude as a handicap system. The launch altitude handicap is to give the Californian flatlanders an advantage.

The other two give the newer pilot with a modest glider equal footing with a diamond badge holder. I believe it has been recently won by new pilots; not because of the pilot handicap, but because it is the intermediate pilot who is most eager to accumulate a variety of soaring experiences.

Membership requirements are private pilot certificate in gliders, checkout with an approved instructor, and initiation fee. Pilots using gliders for cross-country must meet certain minimum requirements.

Use of Mode C Transponders

Reno, Nevada

The potential conflict between gliders and commercial air traffic near Reno has increased with the growth of commercial jet traffic into Reno-Tahoe Airport (RNO) during the past few years. PASCO emphasizes that glider pilots operating in the Reno area must be alert for all air traffic arriving and departing RNO.

Transponder signals are received by Traffic Collision Avoidance Systems (TCAS) on board commercial aircraft as well as by Air Traffic Control (ATC) Radar. By Air Traffic Control (ATC) Letter of Agreement, gliders in the Reno area can transmit the 0440 transponder code in the blind, without establishing radio contact with Reno Approach Control.

PASCO recommends that gliders operating cross country, within 50 NM of Reno-Tahoe Airport, install and use a Mode C altitude encoding transponder.

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
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
